

Willkommen!

Dear Student and Parents,

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome you and your son/daughter back to German class at Apex High School. As always, the start of a new course is full of excitement and I am hopeful that the remainder of the 2018-2019 school year will be academically successful for all students. I am interested in making the learning of a language enjoyable as well as relating its importance to the future of a new and ever changing world. This emphasis is reflected in my personal mission statement: *The study of German at Apex High School challenges students to become linguistically proficient and culturally aware of the global community through meaningful use of the target language.*

Although a newcomer to both Apex High School and North Carolina in 2006, this is my 26th year in the classroom and my 24th full year of helping students develop German language proficiency. From 1995 until 2006 I taught German at Bay Point Middle School in St. Petersburg, Florida, where I served as the Tampa Bay area's only middle school teacher of the language. I am also the 2005-2006 FFLA (Florida Foreign Language Association) German Teacher of the Year (statewide Florida designation for the 2005-2006 school year). Additionally, I was nominated as FLANC (Foreign Language Association of North Carolina) Teacher of the Year in May of 2015.

I will do what I can to give students a barrier-free learning experience. In order to do so, your son/daughter must be responsible for several important matters, primarily: the materials necessary for class, his/her behavior, class participation and all of his/her assignments, including vocabulary practice and readings. Listening, speaking, memorizing, reading and writing are essential skills. We will have audio and visual materials available, which will be used to reinforce classroom presentation of the lessons.

Learning a language requires patience and repetition. Consequently, all students are expected to participate in class. Students will only reap as much benefit as the effort they put into studying a foreign language. **Time invested studying outside of the classroom is more important than the time spent inside school.** Stress to your son/daughter that there is nothing wrong with making mistakes and that it is through mistakes that we learn.

Please review the following guidelines carefully:

CLASS MATERIALS: When the bell rings, students will place on their desks a pen/pencil and their notebooks opened to the previous day's homework/classwork assignment. If a test is being given, all materials should be cleared except what is needed for the test.

ASSIGNMENTS: Whether the assignment is a written or a study requirement, it is important that it be done consistently. *Since each day of language study is built upon the day before, students who fall behind can easily become lost!* Students who are having difficulty with assignments should ask for extra after school help, although prioritizing video game playing, texting and social networking cannot be overcome with tutoring.

NOTEBOOKS: Students are required to keep a 3-ring class binder with ruled paper in which daily exercises are to be written and handouts, corrected homework assignments and returned/corrected quizzes are to be kept. These materials will be of utmost importance when reviewing for unit tests and course exams. *Many handouts will be used again in subsequent German courses.*

MAKE-UP WORK: It is the **student's responsibility** to arrange to make up work **immediately** upon return after an absence. Our class website, Remind 101 and the Home Base system are the resources which

place this ball squarely into the student's court. Except in the case of an extended absence, *pre-assigned work must be submitted on the day of a student's return*. Procedures for submitting work assigned *during* a student absence follow School Board Policy R&P 5510. Class time is not normally used to make up work. *Frequent absences and the lack of student promptness in addressing the resulting missed work are the main causes for lack of success in a language class.*

STUDENT CONDUCT: Students will treat each other and the teacher with respect and helpful consideration and will work at maintaining the pleasant learning environment of our school. German students should seldom need to be reminded of the importance of respectful, responsible behavior. Students in this course will be treated like college students and it is expected that behavior will be mature and that deadlines will be met.

CELL PHONES (HANDYS) AND PERSONAL ELECTRONICS: Please read the Wake County Student *Handbuch* and its rules regarding *appropriate computer and cell phone usage*. Emergency contact with your son/daughter should be made by calling the school's front office at (919) 387-2208.

GRADING: All quizzes, tests, oral presentations, homework and class participation will be evaluated according to the Wake county percentage scale (see *Handbuch*.) Grades for each quarter will be weighted as follows:

- **30% Quizzes (Quiz/Prüfung)** - Students may correct any vocabulary quiz with a grade of 80 or below, for ten extra points, to a maximum score of 80. (If a quiz with a grade of 74% is corrected, it will become an 80%.) To correct a quiz, *correct the entire sentence or re-write the misspelled vocabulary word correctly three times on an attached sheet*. Turn in corrections promptly after the assessment is returned.
- **20% Unit Tests (Examen)** - There will be approximately two to three Examen each quarter.
- **30% Essays (Aufsätze)** - There will be regularly assigned essays of at least 150-200 words. All essays will be graded for content (*Inhalt*) and for grammar, syntax and fluency. Students will be required to correct their syntax/grammar/spelling mistakes based on a common numbered correction sheet. They will then receive 50% of their lost syntax/grammar/spelling points back.
- **10% Homework & Assignments (Aufgaben)** - Student proficiency in German hinges on daily practice with assignments outside of the classroom as well as inside.
- **10% Class Participation (Teilnehmen)** - Students develop their German skills through classroom practice. Most of this grade is earned by speaking German daily in the classroom.

The final exam counts for 20% of the final course grade. Seniors may be exempt from the final, depending on their grade in the course and their attendance record.
